WHERE DO I GO ON THE FIRST DAY OF SCHOOL?



The week before school starts, look forward to a phone call from one of our Leo Leadership students. The Byrne Creek Leos will reach out to all incoming grade 8s with information regarding your first day, and to answer any questions you may have about Byrne Creek.

On the first day of school, you will receive information about lockers, school fees, safety protocols, schedules, etc. An information letter will be sent to Grade 8 students' families explaining what to expect during the first week of September.

Normally, all students have access to a locker. You will choose your own locker online at the end of August at <https://byrnekreekburnaby.lockergm.net/Account/LogIn?returnUrl/> You will also need an extra lock for a gym locker. ALWAYS lock up your things and NEVER leave your valuables in your locker. The school cannot be responsible for lost or stolen items. Keep your combination a secret and your valuables at home. Lockers are school property and teachers or administrators can check your locker at any time.

SUPPORT FOR STUDENTS

Some students entering Grade 8 are still working on mastering some of the concepts taught in Grade 7. In consultation with the elementary schools, classes are designed for these students. (Listed later in program) It is intended, if possible, to prepare students for regular programming.

WHAT IS APPLIED DESIGN SKILLS & TECHNOLOGY: HOME ECONOMICS 8 / TECHNOLOGY EDUCATION 8?

ADST introduces you to the applied skills electives offered at Byrne Creek. Your class will receive instruction in Foods/Nutrition, Clothing /Textiles, Woodworking and Metalwork. These 2 classes alternate days: you will go to one on one day and the other the next day for one semester.

WHAT IS FINE ARTS?

Grade 8 students choose one elective from the following:



ART 8



An introductory course in which students explore a variety of materials in two-dimensional and three-dimensional image making, develop basic drawing skills, and consider the work of selected artists.

DRAMA 8



An introductory course which encourages students to trust themselves and others, reflect on thoughts, feelings and beliefs; take risks within a dramatic context, and actively express themselves in body and voice.

DANCE 8



Students explore a variety of dance styles, and build a foundation of technical dance skills, rhythm and body awareness. Through warm-up exercises, cross-floor patterns, and choreography, students gain skills in creativity, collaboration, personal awareness, and dance etiquette.

BAND 8



Beginners Band is an introductory course by which students are introduced to the maintenance, technique and rudiments of a selected band instrument. Those with Gr 7 band experience should select Concert Band 8. Jazz Band can be added to the schedule of students enrolled in Concert Band.

CHOIR 8



This course offers an introduction to singing. Students will expand on physical concepts of singing that empower them to sing in pitch, with support and in tune.

WHAT IS S.T.E.A.M.?



Steam 8 is a Byrne Creek Science, Technology, Art, Engineering and Math initiative. Student who will thrive in this environment are those who love technology, have a passion for making things and for solving physical problems.

Students enrolled in Steam 8 will enroll in Social Studies, English, PE and French 8 as separate blocks, but will get credit for Science 8, Math 8, Applied Skills 8, and Visual Arts 8 through a half-day, year-long integrated, project-based program, taught by a team of teachers.

Specific courses addressed will include Visual and Media Arts, Electronics, Metalwork, Robotics, Woodwork, Math 8 and Science 8.

Entrance into the program is by application, parent request and recommendation of classroom teacher. Standard School District application procedures for out of catchment and out of district students are followed for entry into STEAM 8. Refer to the SD41 Policy Guide.



The Atrium has lots of seating for you to take your lunch to eat there. If you choose to purchase your lunch, the cafeteria offers a variety of menu items.

Food is available for purchase both at morning break and at lunch hour. Students can also eat their lunches in open classrooms and outside.

WHAT DO I HAVE TO WEAR FOR PHE?



Physical & Health Education strip is required for every class. You may wear any type of shorts (except cut-offs), t-shirt (a change of shirt is recommended), socks, and running shoes.

Sweat/track suits may also be worn. You should be prepared to go outside – bring extra clothing when necessary. If you don't go to class with the correct gym strip you will not be allowed to participate and your mark will be affected.



You will need the basic supplies like pens, pencils and lined notepaper. Most students use 3-ring binders for notes and assignments.

WHAT ABOUT IMPORTANT DATES AND INFORMATION?



At the beginning of the year, grade 8 students receive a mini-handbook containing important information for both students and parents.

In the mini-handbook you will find:

- Important dates for the year (i.e. non-instructional days, last day of term, report card day, etc.)
 - Bell schedule and a space to write your own schedule so you don't forget where you're going
 - Names of key people (counsellor, VP, etc.)

Normally, Byrne Creek operates on a semester system with each class being approximately 70 minutes long. Most often you will have a different teacher for every course and you will have to move to different classrooms for each subject and take your materials with you.

HOW IS SECONDARY SCHOOL DIFFERENT FROM ELEMENTARY?

WHAT IS A SEMESTER SYSTEM?

Schools on a semester system are divided into 2 parts. Students take half (4) of their courses from September to January, and the other half (4) from February to June. For example, if you are assigned to Science 8 in September, you will have Science every day until the end of January. Then you will not have Science again until Grade 9. The following is an example of a Grade 8 timetable:



Semester 1 (Sept. to Jan.)

Period 1 - Science 8
Period 2 - PHE 8
Period 3 - French 8
Period 4 - Social Studies 8



Semester 2 (Feb. to June)

Period 1 - Math 8
Period 2 - Art 8
Period 3 - ADST 8
Period 4 - English 8

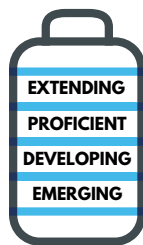
WHEN DO I GET A REPORT CARD?

Sometimes teachers issue an “I” report meaning that you are missing assignments or have work that is incomplete. The “I” report gives you an opportunity to make up some or all of what is missing in order to pass the course. If you do not complete what is expected of you, the following report card will show an “F” which is a failing mark.



Since there is so much work covered in only a few months, you must regularly schedule time to complete homework and projects, review notes, and study for test. Most students will have 5 academic courses: English, Socials, Math, Science, and French.

Report cards are available online quarterly. Final reports are available online in February and June at the end of the semesters. As well, you may receive classroom interim reports between formal reporting periods.



HOW MUCH HOMEWORK SHOULD I BE DOING?

If you don't understand your homework, the first person to see is your teacher. In addition to this, **SUCCESS!** offers extra help to students after school, Monday to Thursday from 3:15 to 4:00 in the Library.

WHO CAN I TURN TO IF I WANT SOME HELP?

MAY I BRING A CELL PHONE TO SCHOOL?

Students are allowed to bring their cell phone to school however, they should only be used during lunch and break. Students are responsible for the care of their own devices. They should not be left in an unlocked locker or bag during PE class.



School is a place of learning and work and therefore you should dress suitably and appropriately. You may be requested to change if the clothing is offensive or inappropriate. You must not wear provocative clothing, inappropriate slogans or clothing that gives the impression that you are supporting a “gang”.

WHAT IF I AM LATE OR ABSENT?



If you are late for class or between classes, you may be required by your subject teacher to make up the missed time. As well, if you are late repeatedly, your subject teacher will phone your home.

If you are absent from school, your parent/guardian contacts the school in the morning to notify the school of your absence, it is recommended that you contact your teacher via TEAMS or email for any work you may miss. When you return to school, you are required to bring a note from your parent and show it to each of your teachers and then hand it into the office. If your absence extends for longer than 3 or 4 days, your parent/guardian can request in the morning phone call, that teachers, if possible, provide homework to the office for pick up by friends/family at the end of the school day.

HOW DO I JOIN?

GET INVOLVED AND YOU WILL GET MORE OUT OF YOUR SCHOOL EXPERIENCE!

“Clubs Day” happens in September. Check out the info tables to find out what each club offers. Information will be included in the daily student bulletin, which is posted outside the office, on the school website and on the TV monitors in the hallways.

The Student Government at Byrne Creek is very active and organizes lots of fun activities: dances, pep rallies, noon hour activities and special activities at Halloween, Christmas, and Valentine's Day.



PARENT INFORMATION

Most students entering secondary school enroll in the regular academic program. There is flexibility, however, to adjust or enrich work, depending on the needs of the student.



Students who have difficulty with the academic curriculum receive support in a variety of ways:

Learning Support: Learning Support is a space designed for students who need extra support with regular classroom assignments, academic skill development, executive functioning, and organization. Recommendation is screened through the School Based Resource Team. (A letter grade is not given for this course.)

PEP (Pre-Employment Program): PEP provides students with the broadest range of skills, experiences and knowledge to become as "work-ready" as possible. After finishing their grade 12 year, students receive a school-leaving certificate (Evergreen). The program curriculum encompasses modified academic studies in English, Social

ACCESS: Programs provide safe and caring learning environments for students who need modified academic programming. The focus is on functional literacy/ numeracy, career and life skills development. Students participate in school/ community based Work Experience. ACCESS students receive a higher level of support for success at school. Placement is via school based Resource team with parent/guardian consent. Students from these programs receive an Evergreen Certificate.



English Language Learning Program

ELL courses support English Language Learners in Grade 8 - 12 in acquiring social and academic language skills.

- Social Language Skills: important for daily communication with teachers, peers and community members
- Academic Language Skills: important for reading, writing, comprehending, expressing and interacting with content-specific materials

Language acquisition is a journey and our ELL teachers aim to support our students to build strong language foundations in order to transition into academic courses.
